# Candy Alexandra González West Bay View Fellow 2019



Candy Alexandra González Philadelphia-based artist born and raised in the Little Havana community of Miami, FL. They are a multidisciplinary visual artist, poet, activist and trauma-informed educator currently exploring themes of body politics, fatphobia and self-healing through photography, poetry, printmaking and papermaking. González's poetic and visual art practice creates work in the spirit of Professor Brené Brown's Ted Talk titled The Power of Vulnerability, where Brown declares that "courage can be defined as a person's ability to tell their story with their whole heart." González's work serves as a space to courageously share their lived



experiences. Their previous work includes a series of poems and long exposure self-portraits titled *Mirror Talk*, where González challenged themself to confront an inability to look at reflections of their body. Long exposure photography demands that subjects remain absolutely still in order to achieve a crisp image. These self-portraits challenged the artist to confront their reflection by looking directly at the camera lens in complete stillness and under the heat of a clamp light. Capturing these very human, though restrained, movements called back to their physical and emotional discomfort experienced while wearing corsets and body shapers as a teenager.

I expanded on Mirror Talk through a series of vivid and viscerally crafted pulp paintings. Some of the pulp paintings depict abstracted landscapes created with the use of tape measures, embedded thread and flesh tone pulp paints, and some are large-scale pulp paintings of semi-nude pictures that I embedded within an accumulation of colorful, organic pulp painted textures. These days, my artwork is inspired by the fat liberation movement and grounded in the works of fat liberationists such as, renowned author Roxane Gay, research therapists Dr. Ericka Hart and Sonalee Rashatwar, photographers Laura Aguilar and Shoog McDaniel, and poet Yesika Salgado.
